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## Using Your TI-84 Plus T Graphing Calculator

The TI-84 Plus T graphing calculator comes with a USB cable, plenty of storage and operating memory. It includes software applications (Apps) to help you perform prealgebra, calculus, and science calculations.

## Keyboard Basics

This section covers basic graphing calculator settings and explains how to navigate the home screen and menus.

## Turning the TI-84 Plus T On and Off

This section covers basic on and off features for your graphing calculator.

## Turning the Graphing Calculator On

Press on.
An information screen displays:

- Press 1 to continue to the home screen but not see this information screen the next time you press on.
-or-
- Press 2 to continue to the home screen.

Note: Any entry from this information screen will take you to the home screen (a blank screen).

The information screen shows the following for information purposes only. You must go to the home screen before you can complete the following.

- Press alpha [f1] -[f4] to locate shortcut menus.

Note: This message also displays when you reset RAM.

## Turning the Graphing Calculator Off

Press 2nd [off].

- The Constant Memory ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ function retains settings and memory, and clears any error condition.
- Press $\Delta$ (if the home screen is blank), to scroll through the calculator history.
- If you turn off the TI-84 Plus T and connect it to another graphing calculator or personal computer, any communication will "wake" it up.


## Automatic Power Down ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ (APD ${ }^{\text {™ }}$ )

- To prolong battery-life, APD ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ automatically turns the TI-84 Plus T off after about three minutes of inactivity.

[^0]- If APD ${ }^{\text {M }}$ turns the graphing calculator off, it will return as you left it, including the display, cursor, and any error.

Note: To prolong battery-life, turn off Exam Mode after an exam and make sure the Exam LED is not blinking. (See section on Exam Mode and Exam LED.)

## Using the TI-84 Plus T Keyboard

This section describes the functions of specific keys on the graphing calculator keyboard.

## TI-84 Plus T Keyboard

Graph/Plot Setup Keys allow access to interactive graphing features.

Editing Keys allow you to edit expressions and values.

Math and Statistics Keys display menus that access math, statistics, and other basic functions.
(4) Scientific Keys allow access to the capabilities of a standard scientific calculator-including trigonometric functions.

Number Keys allow you to enter
 numbers.

6 Common Math Functions allow you to
divide, multiply, subtract, and add.
(1) 2nd Access the second function printed to the left above each key.
(2) alpha Access the third function printed to the right above each key.
alpha Access shortcut menus for [f1] - fraction templates, $\mathrm{n} / \mathrm{d}$, quick
[f4] matrix entry, select MATH menus, and VARS menu functions.


## Primary The function appears on the key.

Function Ex: to display the MATH menu, press math.
Secondary The function appears above the key in the same color as the 2nd key.
Function When you press the 2nd key, the key name printed above the other key becomes active for the next keystroke.
Ex: to display the TEST menu, press 2nd and then math.
The flashing cursor becomes $\mathbf{\uparrow}$ when you press 2nd. $\mathbf{A}$ may also appear in the status bar.

Third The function appears above the key in the same color as the alpha key.
Function The third function allows you to enter alphabetic characters and special symbols, and to access [solve] and shortcut menus.
Ex: to display the letter A, press alpha and then math.
To enter several alphabetic characters in a row, press [2nd [A-lock]to lock the alpha key in the ON position and avoid having to repeatedly press alpha. Press alpha again to unlock it.
The flashing cursor becomes when you press alphat may also appear in the upper right-hand corner of the screen.

## Setting the Display Contrast

This section covers how to set the display brightness and explains automatic dimming.

## Adjusting the Display Contrast

You can adjust the display contrast to suit your viewing angle and lighting conditions.
To adjust the contrast, follow these steps.

- Press 2 nd $\square$ to darken the screen one level at a time.
- Press 2 nd $\triangle$ to lighten the screen one level at a time.

The TI-84 Plus T retains the contrast setting in memory when it is turned off.

## Using the Home Screen



Enter a calculation.
Press 2nd [quit]from any screen until you get back to the home screen.
Press 2nd $[v] 3$ x $\square 4$ x $x^{2} \square 6$ enter


Note: When you are in a MathPrint ${ }^{T M}$ template, the cursor turns into a right arrow $\boldsymbol{D}$ to indicate that you must press $\square$ to get out of the template before you continue entering the calculation.


## Displaying Entries and Answers

Mode settings control how the TI-84 Plus T interprets expressions and displays answers. Press mode to switch between classic entries and MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ mode. This guide focuses on MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Mode, but may reference some classic entries.

## MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Mode

- If an expression exceeds one line, it may scroll off the screen (on the home screen or the $Y=$ screen). Press $\square$ to see the entire expression.

Tip: Press the cursor without pressing 2nd to move the cursor along the line.

- An arrow appears to the left of an answer if it scrolls off the screen. Press $\square$ and 4 before you enter another expression to display the entire answer.

## Scrolling Through the Home Screen History

If all lines of the display are full, text scrolls off the top of the display.
You can scroll up through previous entries and answers on the home screen, even if you have cleared the screen. When you find an entry or answer that you want to use, you can select it and paste it (press enter) on the current entry line.

Note: List and matrix answers cannot be copied and pasted to the new entry line. However, you can copy the list or matrix command to the new entry line and execute the command again to display the answer.

- Press $\triangle$ or $\square$ to move the cursor to the entry or answer you want to copy and then press enter.

The TI-84 Plus T highlights the entry the cursor is on to help you select your desired choice.


The entry or answer that you copied is automatically pasted on the current input line at the cursor location.

Note: If the cursor is in a MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ expression, such as the denominator of a fraction, press alpha $\Delta$ to move the cursor out of the expression and then move the cursor to the entry or answer you want to copy to that location in the MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ template.

- Press clear or del to delete an entry/answer pair. After an entry/answer pair has been deleted, it cannot be displayed or recalled again.


## Returning to the Home Screen

To return to the home screen from any other screen, press 2nd [quit] until you get back to home screen.


Shortcut menus allow quick access to the following:
[f1] Templates to enter fractions, and to toggle between whole and mixed fractions, and fractions and decimals.
[f2] Selected functions from the MATH MATH and MATH NUM menus as you would see them in a textbook, when in MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ mode. Functions include absolute value, numeric differentiation, numeric integration, summation, and log base $n$.
[f3] Quick MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ matrix entry, when available.
[f4] Names of function variables such as Y1 from the VARS Y-VARS menu.
To open a shortcut menu, press alpha plus the corresponding F-key: [f1] for FRAC, [f2] for FUNC, [ f 3$]$ for MTRX, and [f4] for YVAR.

To select a menu item:
-either-

- Press the number corresponding to the item.
-or-
- Use the arrow keys to move the cursor to the appropriate line and then press enter.

You can select all shortcut menu items except matrix templates using standard menus. For example, you can choose the summation template from several places:

The shortcut menus are available to use where input is allowed. If the calculator is in Classic mode, or if a screen is displayed that does not support MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ display, entries will be displayed in Classic mode. The MTRX menu is only available in MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ mode on the home screen and in the $Y=$ editor.

Note: Shortcut menus may not be available if alpha plus F-key combinations are used while an application is running.

## Display Cursors

The cursor may change to indicate what will happen when you press the next key or when you select the next menu item to be pasted as a character.

Note: The second cursor $\boldsymbol{T}$ and alpha cursor may appear on the status bar, depending on the context.

| Cursor | Appearance | Effect of Next Keystroke |
| :---: | :---: | :---: |
| Entry | Solid rectangle | This is the default cursor. Enter characters at this cursor; this overrides any existing character. |
| Insert | Underline | Press 2nd [ins] for this cursor. Enter characters in front of the cursor location. |
| Second | Reverse arrow $\uparrow$ | This allows you to enter a 2nd character or complete a 2 nd operation. |
| Alpha | Reverse A回 | An alpha character is entered, SOLVE is executed, or shortcut menus are displayed. |
| Full | Checkerboard rectangle " | No entry; the maximum characters are entered at a prompt or memory is full. Also indicates the limit of the allowed MathPrint ${ }^{T M}$ mode levels. |
| MathPrint ${ }^{\text {™ }}$ | Right arrow | The cursor moves to either the next part of the template or out of the template. Press the right arrow to move out of all MathPrint ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ templates before entering the remaining terms in an expression. |

If you press alpha during an insertion, the cursor becomes an underlined $\mathbf{A}(\mathbf{A})$. If you press 2nd during an insertion, the underlined cursors becomes an underlined $\uparrow$ ( $\uparrow$ ).

Note: If you highlight a small character such as a colon or a comma and then press alpha or 2nd, the cursor does not change because the cursor width is too narrow.

## Busy Indicator

When the TI-84 Plus T is calculating or graphing, a vertical moving line is displayed as a busy indicator in the top-right corner of the screen. When you pause a graph or a program, the busy indicator becomes a vertical moving dotted line.

## Working with Menus

You can access TI-84 Plus T commands using menus.

## Displaying a Menu

- When you press a key to display a menu, that menu temporarily replaces the screen where you are working.
- Ex: press math to display the MATH menu.
- After you select an item from a menu, the screen where you are working usually displays again.


## Moving from One Menu to Another

Some keys access more than one menu. When you press such a key, the names of all accessible menus are displayed on the top line. When you highlight a menu name, the items in that menu are displayed. Press $\square$ and to highlight each menu name.
Note: FRAC shortcut menu items are found in the FRAC menu, and are also found on the MATH NUM menu. FUNC
 shortcut menu items are also found on the MATH MATH menu.

## Scrolling a Menu

To scroll down the menu items, press $\nabla$. To scroll up the menu items, press $\triangle$.
To page down six menu items at a time, press alpha $\nabla$. To page up six menu items at a time, press alpha $\Delta$.

To go to the last menu item directly from the first menu item, press $\Delta$. To go to the first menu item directly from the last menu item, press $\square$.

## Selecting an Item from a Menu

You can select an item from a menu in two ways.
Press the number or letter of the item you want to select. The cursor can be anywhere on the menu, and the item you select does not need to be displayed on the screen.

-or-
Press $\square$ or $\Delta$ to move the cursor to the item you want, and then press enter.

## Leaving a Menu without Making a Selection

You can leave a menu without making a selection in these two ways.

- Press 2nd [quit] to return to the home screen.
-Or-
- Press clear to return to the previous screen.


## Using Menus

When you press a key or key combination to display a menu, one or more menu names appear on the top line of the screen.

- The menu name on the left side of the top line is highlighted. Up to seven items in that menu are displayed, beginning with item 1, which also is highlighted.
- A number or letter identifies each item's place in the menu. The order is 1 through 9 , then 0 , then $A, B, C$. Once number and letter options are exhausted, the item number or letter area will be blank. Select these items using the arrow keys.
- When the menu continues beyond the displayed items, a down arrow ( $\downarrow$ ) replaces the colon next to the last displayed item.
- When a menu item ends in an ellipsis (...), the item displays a secondary menu, editor, or wizard when you select it.
- When an asterisk (*) appears to the left of a menu item, that item is stored in user data archive. You must move other files (displayed with an asterisk) from archive to RAM in the MEM menu to use those files in the calculator.


## MATH Menus

Note: The Constant Memory ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ feature retains mode settings when the unit is turned off.

## Changing Mode Settings

To change mode settings, follow these steps:

1. Press $\square$ or to move the cursor to the line of the setting that you want to change.
2. Press $\square$ or to move the cursor across the line to the desired setting.
3. Press enter to select a setting.

## MATHPRINT ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CLASSIC

MATHPRINT ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ mode displays most inputs and outputs the way they are shown in textbooks, such as $\frac{1}{2}+\frac{3}{4}$ and.
CLASSIC mode displays expressions and answers as if written on one line, such as $1 / 2+$ 3/4. (Fraction bars appear as thick lines. A division operation will appear as a thin slash mark.)

## Note:

- Some areas in MATHPRINT ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ mode display in classic (one line) formats.
- If you switch between these modes, most entries (except matrix calculations) will be preserved.


## NORMAL SCI ENG

Answers are displayed in standard formats when the calculation or setting forces a decimal result on the calculator.

| Notation for $\mathbf{1 2 3 4 5 . 6 7}$ | Decimal answer displays as: |
| :--- | :--- |
| NORMAL | 12345.67 |
| Retains the decimal notation up to limits of <br> Re calculator display and memory. |  |
| SCI (Scientific1.234567 $\times 10^{4}$ ) <br> One digit to the left of the decimal with <br> the appropriate power of 10 to the right of <br> *E. |  |

## Note:

The keypad contains 2nd [EE], which displays as E on the calculator. *ThisE in the display stands for "x10" and the number entered after E becomes the power of 10 . The calculator notation, E , designates the "x10" part of the number without using extra parentheses. The calculator then follows the order of operations as expected when using SCI or ENG notation. This notation, E, is not typically accepted on homework and exams, and written results should use the standard notation, for example, the $1.234567 \times 10^{4}$.
If you select NORMAL notation, but the answer cannot display in 10 digits (or the absolute value is less than .001), the TI-84 Plus T expresses the answer in scientific notation.

FLOAT $0 \begin{array}{llllllllll} & 2 & 3 & 4 & 5 & 6 & 7 & 8 & 9\end{array}$
FLOAT (floating) decimal mode displays up to 10 digits, plus the sign and decimal.
FLOAT will display in the status bar.
Selecting $\mathbf{0 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9}$ specifies the number of digits ( 0 through 9) to display to the right of the decimal for decimal answers. FIX\# will display in the status bar.

The decimal setting applies to NORMAL, SCI, and ENG notation modes.
The decimal setting applies to these numbers, with respect to the ANSWER mode setting:

- An answer displayed on the home screen
- Coordinates on a graph
- The Tangent( DRAW instruction equation of the line, $x$, and $d y / d x$ values
- Results of calculated operations
- The regression equation stored after the execution of a regression model


## RADIAN DEGREE

Angle modes control how the calculator interprets angle values in trigonometric functions and polar/rectangular conversions. The RADIAN or DEGREE setting will display in the status bar.

RADIAN mode interprets angle values as radians. Answers display in radians.
DEGREE mode interprets angle values as degrees. Answers display in degrees. Polar complex number arguments are always interpreted in radians.

## FUNCTION PARAMETRIC POLAR SEQ

Graphing modes define the graphing parameters.
FUNCTION graphing mode plots functions, where Y is a function of X .
PARAMETRIC graphing mode plots relations, where $X$ and $Y$ are functions of $T$.
POLAR graphing mode plots functions, where $\mathbf{r}$ is a function of $\theta$.
SEQUENCE graphing mode plots sequences.Three sequences are available: $u$, $v$, and $w$ as functions of $n$.

CONNECTED DOT

| Line Style: | Graphs as: |
| :--- | :--- |
| CONNECTED | Connected plotting mode draws a line conecting each point calculated for <br> the selected functions. |
| DOT | Dot plotting mode plots only the calculated points of the selected <br> functions. |

## SEQUENTIAL SIMUL

SEQUENTIAL graphing-order mode evaluates and plots one function completely before the next function is evaluated and plotted.

SIMUL (simultaneous) graphing-order mode evaluates and plots all selected functions for a single value of $X$ and then evaluates and plots them for the next value of $X$.

Note: Regardless of which graphing mode is selected, the calculator will sequentially graph all stat plots before it graphs any functions.

REAL a+bi re^( $\theta i$ )
REAL mode does not display complex results unless complex numbers are entered as input.

Two complex modes display complex results.

- $\mathbf{a}+\mathbf{b} i$ (rectangular complex mode) displays complex numbers in the form $\mathrm{a}+\mathrm{b} i$.
- $\mathbf{r e}^{\wedge}(\theta i)$ (polar complex mode) displays complex numbers in the form re^( $\theta i)$.

Note: The TI-84 Plus T does not support a complex number as a value in a fraction numerator and denominator.

## FULL HORIZONTAL GRAPH-TABLE

FULL screen mode uses the entire screen to display a graph or edit screen.
Each split-screen mode displays two screens simultaneously.

- HORIZONTAL mode displays the current graph on the top half of the screen; it displays the home screen or an editor on the bottom half.
- GRAPH-TABLE mode displays the current graph on the left half of the screen; it displays the table screen on the right half.

## FRACTION TYPE: $n / d \quad U n / d$

n/d displays results as a simple fraction. Fractions may contain a maximum of six digits in the numerator; the value of the denominator may not exceed 9999.
$\mathbf{U n} / \mathbf{d}$ displays results as a mixed number, if applicable. $\mathbf{U}, \mathbf{n}$, and $\mathbf{d}$ must be all be integers. If $\mathbf{U}$ is a non-integer, the result may be converted $\mathbf{U} \mathbf{n} / \mathbf{d}$. If $\boldsymbol{n}$ or $\mathbf{d}$ is a noninteger, a syntax error is displayed. The whole number, numerator, and denominator may each contain a maximum of three digits.

## ANSWERS: AUTO DEC

AUTO displays answers in a similar format as the input. For example, if a fraction is entered in an expression, the answer will be in fraction form, if possible. If a decimal appears in the expression, the output will be a decimal number.

DEC displays answers as integers or decimal numbers.
Note: The ANSWERS mode setting also affects how values in sequences, lists, and tables are displayed. You can also convert values from decimal to fraction or fraction to


## STAT DIAGNOSTICS: OFF <br> ON

OFF displays a statistical regression calculation without the correlation coefficient (r) or the coefficient of determination ( $\mathrm{r}^{2}$ ).

ON displays a statistical regression calculation with the correlation coefficient (r), and the coefficient of determination $\left(r^{2}\right)$, as appropriate.

## STAT WIZARDS: ON OFF

ON: Selection of menu items in MATH PROB, STAT, CALC, DISTR DISTR, DISTR DRAW and seq( in LIST OPS displays a screen which provides syntax help (wizard) for the entry of required and optional arguments into the command or function. The function or command will paste the entered arguments to the Home Screen history or to most other locations where the cursor is available for input. Some calculations will compute directly from the wizard. If a command or function is accessed from [catalog] the command or function will paste without wizard support.

OFF: The function or command will paste to the cursor location with no syntax help (wizard).

## SET CLOCK

Use the clock to set the time and date, select the clock display format, and turn the clock on and off. The clock is turned on by default and is accessed from the mode screen.

Press mode.
Press $\triangle \Delta$ to move the cursor to SET CLOCK.

Press enter to change clock settings.


Note: You may have to reset the clock if your battery power runs out.
See education.ti.com for future updates on the battery and battery preservation features.
Note: You can turn off the clock using ClockOff and Clock On in Catalog.

## Using the Special Character Set

The TI-84 Plus T CATALOG provides an item called CHARACTER if the Language Localizer App is running. You will find this item listed after several English commands in CATALOG. You can use this item to access special characters and accent marks for display messages and text strings that you want to store to a variable. You cannot use them in variable names.

Press 2nd [catalog] to display the CATALOG.
Note: If running a Language Localizer App, a CHARACTER editor is listed after any commands that remain in English.


Press ENTER to display the CHARACTER screen.
Accent marks appear in the menus at the bottom of the screen.


You can:
Select a special character:
Press $\square, \square, \nabla$, or $\triangle$ to move the box to the special character that you want to use in a message or text string.
Press ENTER to place the character on the edit line.
Press $\square, \square, \square$, or $\Delta$ to move the box to Done.
Press ENTER to paste the contents of the edit line to the previous screen.
-or-
Add an accent mark to a character:
Press the function key ([F1], [ f 2$],[\mathrm{F} 3],[\mathrm{F} 4]$, or [F5]) immediately above the accent mark to select it. The ALPHA uppercase mode is automatically turned on. To change to lowercase, press ALPHA.

Press the key associated with the alpha character that you want to accent, for example, [A] (above math). The accented character is displayed in the edit line. Press $\square, \square, \nabla$, or $\Delta$ to move the box to Done.
Press ENTER to paste the contents of the edit line to the previous screen.

## Evaluating Expressions

An expression is a group of

- numbers,
- variables,
- functions and their arguments,
-or-
- a combination of these elements.

An expression evaluates to a single answer.
On the TI-84 Plus T, you enter an expression in the same order as you would write it on paper. For example: $\pi R^{2}$ is an expression.

## Order of Operations

The TI-84 Plus T uses an order of operations system called Equation Operating System (EOS ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ ), which

- defines the order in which functions in expressions are entered and evaluated
-and-
- allows you to enter numbers and functions in a simple, straightforward sequence.

EOS $^{\text {TM }}$ evaluates the functions in an expression in this order:

| Order | Function |
| :--- | :--- |
| 1 | Functions that precede the argument, such as $\sin ($ or $\log ($ |
| 2 | Functions that are entered after the argument, such as $2,-1,!,{ }^{\circ}, r$, and <br> conversions |
| 3 | Powers and roots, such as $2^{5}$ or $5^{x} \sqrt{32}$ |
| 4 | Permutations (nPr) and combinations (nCr) |
| 5 | Multiplication, implied multiplication, and division |

Note: Within a priority level, EOS ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ evaluates functions from left to right. Calculations within parentheses are evaluated first. A number in scientific or engineering notation, 2.34E6, is interpreted as $\left(2.3 \times 10^{6}\right)$ with parentheses so the number remains the correct value during the EOS ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ calculation.

## Implied Multiplication

The TI-84 Plus T recognizes implied multiplication, so you do not need to press $\boxtimes$ to express multiplication in all cases. For example, the TI-84 Plus T interprets $\mathbf{2 \pi}$, $\mathbf{4}$ sin (46), 5(1+2), and (2*5)7 as implied multiplication.

Note: TI-84 Plus T implied multiplication rules differ from those of some other graphing calculators. For example, the TI-84 Plus T evaluates $\mathbf{1 / 2 X}$ as (1/2)X, while some graphing calculators may evaluate $\mathbf{1 / 2 X}$ as $\mathbf{1 / ( 2 X )}$.

## Parentheses

The TI-84 Plus T completes all calculations inside a pair of parentheses first. For example, in the expression $\mathbf{4 ( 1 + 2 )}$, EOS ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ first evaluates the portion inside the parentheses, $1+2$, and then multiplies the answer, 3 , by 4.


## Negation

To enter a negative number, use the negation key. Press $(-)$ and then enter the number. On the TI-84 Plus T, negation is in the third level in the EOS ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ hierarchy. Functions in the first level, such as squaring, are evaluated before negation.

Example: $-\mathrm{x}^{2}$, evaluates to a negative number (or 0 ). Use parentheses to square a negative number.


Note: Use the $\square$ key for subtraction and the $(-)$ key for negation. If you press $\square$ to enter a negative number, as in $9 \times \square$, or if you press $(-)$ to indicate subtraction, as in $9(-) \mathbf{7}$, an error occurs. If you press alpha $\mathbf{A}(-)$ alpha $\mathbf{B}$, it is interpreted as implied multiplication (A)(-B).

## Entering Expressions and Instructions

You can use an expression on the home screen to calculate an answer. In most places where a value is required, you can use an expression to enter a value.


## Entering an Expression

To create an expression, you enter numbers, variables, and functions using the keyboard and menus. An expression is evaluated when you press enter, regardless of the cursor location. The entire expression is evaluated according to EOS ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ rules, and the answer is displayed according to the mode setting for Answer.

Note: Most TI-84 Plus T functions and operations are symbols comprising several characters. You must enter the symbol from the keyboard or a menu; do not spell it out. For example, to calculate the log of 45, you must press $\log 45$. Do not enter the letters L, O, and G. If you enter LOG, the TI-84 Plus T interprets the entry as implied multiplication of the variables $\mathbf{L}, \mathbf{O}$, and $\mathbf{G}$.

To enter a matrix name:

1. Press 2nd [matrix].

The Matrix Names menu appears.
2. Press the number on the keypad that corresponds with the desired Matrix Name. Ex: Press 1 for [A] as shown.

## Multiple Entries on a Line

To enter two or more expressions or instructions on a line, separate them with colons (alpha [: ]). All instructions are stored together in last entry (ENTRY).


## Entering a Number in Scientific Notation

1. Enter the part of the number that precedes the exponent. This value can be an expression.
2. Press 2nd [EE]. E is pasted to the cursor location.
3. Enter the exponent, which can be one or two digits.

## Notes:

- If the exponent is negative, press $(-)$, and then enter the exponent.
- E stands for "x10" and the calculator interprets the entire number as $\left(1.23 .45 \times 10^{-2}\right)$ as if it was entered with parentheses.
$123.45 \mathrm{E}^{-2} 1.2345$

When you enter a number in scientific notation, the TI-84 Plus T does not automatically display answers in scientific or engineering notation. The mode settings and the size of the number determine the display format.

## Functions

A function returns a value. For example, $\log ($ and $\boldsymbol{\operatorname { s i n }}$ ( are functions. In general, the first letter of each function is lowercase. Most functions take at least one argument, as indicated by an open parenthesis following the name. For example, $\boldsymbol{\operatorname { s i n }}$ ( requires one argument, sin (value).

## Instructions

An instruction (command) initiates an action on the calculator. For example, ClrDraw is an instruction to the calculator to clear drawn elements from a graph. Instructions cannot be used in expressions. In general, the first letter of each instruction name is uppercase. Some instructions take more than one argument, as indicated by an open parenthesis at the end of the name. For example, on the TI-84 Plus T, Circle( requires three arguments: $\operatorname{Circle}(X, Y$, radius $)$.

## Interrupting a Calculation

To interrupt a calculation or graph in progress, which is indicated by the busy indicator in the status bar, press on.

When you interrupt a calculation, a menu is displayed.

- To return to the home screen, select 1:Quit.
- To go to the location of the interruption, select 2:Goto.

When you interrupt a graph, a partial graph is displayed.

- To return to the home screen, press clear or any non-graphing key.
- To restart graphing, press a graphing key or select a graphing instruction.

## Working with Graphs

This section covers how to change color options on a graph, how to draw points on a graph, and how to insert an image as a background on a graph.

## Using the Graph Screen

The examples below show how to set up the graph of a function. Here, the mode is set to FUNCTION and the default settings are assumed.

Enter an equation in the $\mathrm{Y}=$ editor.
Press $Y=$.
Press (-) $X, T, \theta, n \quad x^{2} \boxplus 6$.
Press zoom to select pre-set graph windows. Press zoom 6:ZStandard.

Press [graph].

Press [trace] and use arrow keys to trace along the graph.

Press [2] to jump to $\mathrm{X}=2$.

Note: Use the CALCULATE menu (2nd [calc]) to find minimum or maximum of functions and more.

## Working with Matrices

You can enter matrices using the matrix editor on your graphing calculator. For example, you can perform the following operations on matrices:

- Addition
- Division
- Elementary Row Operations
- Inverses
- Multiplication
- Subtraction


## To Use the Matrix Editor

1. Press 2nd [matrix].
2. Press $\square$ to navigate to the EDIT submenu.
3. Select from one of 10 allowed matrix variable names $[\mathrm{A}]-[\mathrm{J}]$.
4. Enter the dimension of the matrix, then enter values in each matrix cell.

Note: Once in the editor, use the arrow keys to navigate between cells.

## Example:

Matrix [C] as a $3 \times 3$ matrix is now in memory.


## To Perform a Calculation with a Matrix

1. Press 2nd [quit] to the go to the Home Screen.
2. Press 2nd [matrix] use the MATH submenu to select a matrix command.
3. Use the NAMES submenu to paste the matrix name.

Note: A matrix name, such as [C], is a special character and can ONLY be pasted for a calculation from the [matrix] NAMES menu and not typed from the calculator keypad.

## Example:

To find the determinant of [C] as entered above:

- Use the [matrix] MATH menu to paste the
- 1: det( command

- [matrix] NAMES 3: [C]
as matrix variables to the Home Screen.


Note: Remember that you cannot type in a matrix name from the calculator keypad. Use the [MATRIX] NAMES menu to paste a matrix name.

## Working with Probability and Statistics

This section covers probability and statistics commands.

- Probability commands deal with random numbers, which are generated by algorithms on the calculator.
- Statistics commands allow you to create lists of data, then plot or analyze that data.


## Working with Probability

You can find probability commands in the math PROB submenu. Probability commands deal with random numbers, which are generated by algorithms on the calculator.

## Example:

To generate a set of five random integers between 10 and 25 (inclusive):

1. Press math, then press $\square$ until you highlight PROB.
2. Press until you highlight 5: randInt(, then enter.

3. Enter the correct syntax for this command: randInt(lower, upper, number of integers). Press enter.
4. Press enter again to see the random set of integers.


Note: With each rand execution, the TI-84 Plus T generates the same random-number sequence for a given seed value. The TI-84 Plus T factory-set seed value for rand is 0 . To generate a different random-number sequence, store any nonzero seed value to rand. To restore the factory-set seed value, store 0 to rand, or reset the defaults by going to 2nd [mem] 7:Reset....

Note: The seed value also affects randInt(, randNorm(, and randBin( instructions.

## Working with Statistics

You can find statistics commands in the stat menu. You can create lists of data, then plot or analyze that data using the statistics commands.

You can use the following statistics functions:

## Inferential Statistics

You can perform 16 hypothesis tests and confidence intervals and 15 distribution functions. You can display hypothesis test results graphically or numerically.

## To enter lists of data:

1. Press stat.
2. Select 1: Edit in the EDIT submenu, then enter.

3. Enter your data into list columns.

Note: Once in the list editor, use the arrow keys to enter the data in the lists. L1 - L6 are built-in list names.


## To plot this data:

4. Press 2nd [stat plot].
5. Press 1: Plot1 (to set up a scatter plot for L1 and L2), then enter.

6. Press to highlight On. Press enter.

7. Press zoom to automatically set up a graphing window for your data.
8. Press 9: ZoomStat to see the graph.
9. Press trace and arrow keys to trace on the plot.


Note: You can plot your statistics data in these ways:

- Scatter plot
- xyLine
- Histogram
- Regular or Modified box-and-whisker plot
- Normal probability plot

To find the two variable statistics for L1 and L2:

1. Press stat.
2. Press $\square$ to highlight CALC.
3. Press $\square$ until you highlight 2:2-Var Stats, then enter.

4. Press until you highlight Calculate, then enter.

## Working with Variables

You can enter and use several types of data, including real and complex numbers, matrices, lists, functions, stat plots, graph databases, graph pictures, and strings.

## Using Variable Names

## Variables and Defined Items

You can enter and use several types of data, including real and complex numbers, matrices, lists, functions, stat plots, graph databases, graph pictures, and strings.

The TI-84 Plus T uses assigned names for variables and other items saved in memory. For lists, you also can create your own five-character names.

* Once a list contains a complex number, it is designated as a complex list. To change a list to Real numbers, delete the list and enter the Real values.


## Notes about Variables

- You can create as many list names as memory will allow.
- Programs have user-defined names and share memory with variables.
- From the home screen or from a program, you can store to matrices, lists, strings, and system variables such as Xmax, TblStart, and all $\mathbf{Y}=$ functions.
- From an editor, you can store to matrices, lists, and $\mathbf{Y}=$ functions.
- From the home screen, a program, or an editor, you can store a value to a matrix element or a list element.
- You can use DRAW STO menu items to store and recall Pic Vars.
- Although most variables can be archived, system variables including $r, T, X, Y$, and $\theta$ cannot be archived.
- Apps are independent applications that are built-in the TI-84 Plus T. Apps cannot be deleted. Additional Apps cannot be loaded.


## Storing Variable Values

## Storing Values in a Variable

Values are stored to and recalled from memory using variable names. When you evaluate an expression that contains a variable name, the graphing calculator substitutes the value currently stored in that variable.

To store a value to a variable from the home screen or a program using the sto $\rightarrow$ key, begin on a blank line and follow these steps.

1. Enter the value you want to store. The value can be an expression.
2. Press sto $\rightarrow$.
$\rightarrow$ is copied to the cursor location.
3. Press alpha and then the letter of the variable to which you want to store the value.
4. Press enter. The graphing calculator evaluates the expression and stores the value to the variable.


## Displaying a Variable Value

To display the value of a variable, enter the variable name on a blank line on the home screen, and then press enter.


## Archiving Variables (Archive, Unarchive)

You can store variables in the TI-84 Plus T user data archive, a protected area of memory separate from RAM. The user data archive lets you:

- Store data, programs, applications or any other variables to a safe location where they cannot be edited or deleted inadvertently.
- Create additional free RAM by archiving variables.

By archiving variables that you do not need to edit frequently, you can free up RAM for applications that may require additional memory.

The graphing calculator places an asterisk (*)to the left of archived variables. You cannot edit or execute archived variables. You can only see and unarchive them.

## Example:

If you archive a list named L1, you will see that it exists in memory. However, if you select and paste the name L1 to the home screen, it will not appear on the home screen. You must unarchive it in order to see its contents and edit it.

## Recalling Variable Values

## Using Recall (RCL)

To recall and copy variable contents to the current cursor location, follow these steps. To leave RCL, press clear.

1. Press 2nd [rcl]. RCL and the edit cursor are displayed on the bottom line of the screen.
2. Enter the name of the variable in one of the following ways:

- Press alpha and then the letter of the variable.
- Press 2nd [list], and then select the name of the list, or press 2nd [L1] or [L2], and so forth.
- Press 2nd [matrix], and then select the name of the matrix.
- Press vars to display the VARS menu or vars to display the VARS Y-VARS menu; then select the type and then the name of the variable or function.
- Press alpha [f4] to display the YVAR shortcut menu, then select the name of the function.

The variable name you selected is displayed on the bottom line and the cursor disappears.

3. Press enter. The variable contents are inserted where the cursor was located before you began these steps.


## Notes:

- You can edit the characters pasted to the expression without affecting the value in memory.
- You can use Rcl in the $Y=$ editor to paste a current function to a new YVar to avoid retyping long expressions.

Press math B:Solver... to access the built-in numeric solver and the pre-loaded polynomial and systems of equations solver, PlySmlt2 App.

## Steps for the Numeric Solver

1. Enter your equation as $0=$ expression and press enter.
2. Place the cursor on the variable to solve.

- $\quad$ For this example, the variable is X with stored value 5 .

3. Enter a value for the variable close to your estimate of the solution.

- If needed, look at the graph or table of your equation to know the approximate location of the solution(s).
- (Advanced) Bound - \{-1E99, 1E99\} represents the calculator version of the Real Number line: $\left\{-1 \times 10^{99}, 1 \times 10^{99}\right\}$. You can change this interval to be close to where you estimate the solution especially if you expect multiple solutions such as for a quadratic equation.
- For many textbook problems, you probably will not have to change this line. •

4. Press the [alpha (enter) find the calculator's numeric solution.

- The solution will be marked with a small square next to the variable.
- The line "left-rt=0" gives the expression evaluated at the calculated solution. "left-rt=0" implies the equation " $0=e q n$ " is satisfied by the solution. If "left-rt" is not zero, the value can be interpreted to tell you if the calculated solution is close to the solution.

## Managing Calculator Files

## Transferring the OS／Apps from Calculator to Calculator

You can transfer the operating system（OS）and built－in Apps from one calculator to another using a USB unit－to－unit cable．You must have all factory－loaded Apps on the sending calculator prior to this transfer．If any Apps have been deleted from a TI－84 Plus T，you cannot send the OS／Apps unit－to－unit from that TI－84 Plus T．You will have to download the correct TI－84 Plus T OS（with Apps）file for the TI－84 Plus T at education．ti．com／go／download．Then use TI Connect CE to load the complete OS／Apps file to the TI－84 Plus T．

If the sending TI－84 Plus T has all of the original Apps on the calculator，connect the two calculators by firmly inserting the USB cable ends into the calculators．The USB port is located on the top of the calculator．

Note：Make sure the four AAA batteries in your TI－84 Plus T are not low prior to sending an OS／App．A warning screen displays when batteries are too low for transfers．

## Compatibility with Graphing Calculators

－AppVars and TI－Basic Programs should be reviewed for use after the transfer between the TI－84 Plus T family of graphing calculators．Some AppVars may not setup an App as expected．Some of the TI－Basic Programs will need to be modified due to the difference in screen resolution and new commands．
－TI－Basic Programs created using commands available only in the latest OS version will not transfer to graphing calculators with an earlier OS version．

## Exam Mode and Exam LED

## Battery Management Prior to an Exam

The TI-84 Plus T uses 4 AAA batteries.
TI recommends that you:

- Use new batteries for an exam
- Bring an extra set of new batteries to the exam
- You cannot enter exam mode if the graphing calculator is in a low or critically-low battery state


## Low Battery

If the battery is low:

- A low-battery warning screen will display when you turn on the graphing calculator
- Replace your batteries


## Critically-Low Battery

If the battery is critically low:

- A low-battery message may flash on the Home Screen
- The calculator will turn off
- Replace your batteries


## Entering Exam Mode

You may not set this calculator in exam mode unless you are instructed by the examiner.

1. Turn the calculator off (alphan).
2. Press and hold $\dagger$, enter, 0 O .
3. Press OK on each screen to place calculator in exam mode.

- Exam LED will blink amber.

To turn LED off and re-enable files after the exam, link (via unit-to-unit cable) to another calculator and send a list. You can also connect to a computer and use TI Connect ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE to drag a file off. To do this, click on the TI Connect ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE window, then drag the file back on to your calculator to turn off the exam LED.

You should turn the exam LED off after the exam to preserve your battery.

## Using Press-to-Test Mode

- Press-to-Test is a three-key sequence to place the TI-84 Plus T in the allowed state for an exam.
- You may only set the calculator in exam mode when you are instructed by the examiner.
- The Exam LED will blink amber when you have properly set the calculator up for the exam.
- Press-to-Test Mode:
- Deletes all RAM and selected Archive files
- Does not disable Apps from the TI-developed built-in Apps list below (as long as they have not been deleted prior to going into Press-to-Test)
- Disables TI-Basic Programs and does not allow programming
- Conic Graphing
- Inequality Graphing
- Polynomial Root Finder and Simultaneous Equation Solver
- Equation Solver
- Language Localization Apps

See the "Using Applications" section for more information on Apps.

## To use Press-to-Test:

1. With the calculator turned OFF, press and hold $\square$, enter, and 0 .
2. Release all three keys. (The RESET OPTIONS screen displays.)
3. Select OK.
4. Press any key.

- In memory management (2nd [mem] Mem Mgmt/Del), disabled files will display with the not equal sign.


## Notes:

The $\mathrm{TI}-84$ Plus T is in exam mode when the LED is blinking amber.
You can take the TI-84 Plus T out of exam mode using the following methods:

- Link a calculator to a calculator (via the unit-to-unit cable), and then transfer any file(s) by pressing 2nd [Link] SEND/RECEIVE.
-or-
- Send a calculator file from the computer using TI Connect ${ }^{T M}$ CE.

Note: To preserve battery life, take your calculator out of Press-to-Test after the exam.

These applications are built-in on your TI-84 Plus T. You cannot load additional Apps.
Apps can be deleted using Memory Management in [mem] if needed for exams.
To replace any deleted Apps, you will have to reload the full OS/Apps file, which you can find at education.ti.com/go/download. You will need TI Connect ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE software to reload the $\overline{O S} / A p p s$ on the calculator. You can transfer the OS and built-in Apps unit-to-unit from another TI-84 Plus T, but only if the sending calculator has the complete set of built-in Apps.

## Using the Tl-SmartView ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE

The TI-SmartView ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE software allows you to display a TI graphing calculator for your entire classroom. With TI-SmartView ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE software, you can:

- View the history of your key press entries.
- Capture and save screen shots to use in other documents as you investigate a math or science concept.
- Use the View ${ }^{3 \text { rm }}$ pane to show three additional screens simultaneously.

The TI-SmartView ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ CE software includes two workspaces:
Calculator Emulator: allows you to perform calculations and view answers as you would on a physical calculator

Emulator Explorer: allows you to manage calculator content

## Battery Information

The TI-84 Plus T uses five batteries:

- Four AAA alkaline batteries
-plus-
- One LR44 Alkaline 1.5 V backup battery (or equivalent)
- The backup battery provides auxiliary power to retain memory while you replace the AAA batteries.


## When to Replace the Batteries

When the battery voltage level drops below a usable level, the TI-84 Plus T:

Displays this message when you turn on the unit.


## Message A

- After you first see Message A, you can expect the batteries to function for about one to two weeks, depending on how often you use the graphing calculator. (This one- to two-week period is based on tests with alkaline batteries; the performance of other types of batteries may vary.)
- If you see Message B, you must replace the batteries immediately to successfully download an application.

Note: Replace the backup battery every three or four years.

## Effects of Replacing the Batteries

- Do not remove both types of batteries (AAA and the backup battery) at the same time.
- Do not allow the batteries to lose power completely.

If you follow these guidelines and the steps for replacing the batteries, you can replace either type of battery without losing any information in memory.

## Battery Precautions

Take these precautions when replacing batteries:

- Do not leave batteries within reach of children.
- Do not mix new and used batteries.
- Do not mix brands (or types within brands) of batteries.
- Do not mix rechargeable and non-rechargeable batteries.
- Install batteries according to polarity (+ and N) diagrams.
- Do not place non-rechargeable batteries in a battery recharger.
- Properly dispose of used batteries immediately.
- Do not leave them within the reach of children.
- Do not incinerate or dismantle batteries.


## Replacing the Batteries

To replace the batteries, follow these steps:

1. Turn off the graphing calculator

- Turn off the graphing calculator: 2nd [off].
- Replace the slide cover over the keyboard to avoid inadvertently turning on the graphing calculator.
- Turn the back of the unit toward you.


## 2. Remove the battery cover

- Hold the graphing calculator upright.
- Push downward on the latch on the top of the battery cover.
- Pull the cover toward you.

3. Replace either type of battery

Note: To avoid loss of information stored in memory, you must turn off the graphing calculator. Do not remove the AAA batteries and the backup battery simultaneously.

To replace the AAA alkaline batteries:

- Remove all four discharged AAA batteries.
- Install new ones according to the polarity (+ and N) diagram in the battery compartment.


To replace the backup battery:

- Remove the screw from the backup battery cover.
- Remove the cover.
- Install the new battery, + side up.
- Replace the cover and secure it with the screw.

Note: Use a LR44 Alkaline 1.5 V backup battery (or equivalent).
4. Replace the backup battery compartment cover
a) Turn the graphing calculator on.
b) Adjust the display contrast, if necessary, by pressing 2nd, $\Delta$, or $\square$.

## Diagnosing and Correcting Error Conditions

The TI-84 Plus T detects errors while performing these tasks:

- Evaluating an expression
- Executing an instruction
- Plotting a graph
- Storing a value

1. Determine the error. The error screens give helpful hints about what may have happened, but the errors are not always fully explained.
2. Correct the expression.

## Diagnosing an Error

When the TI-84 Plus T detects an error, it returns an error message with a short description.

| NORMAL FLOAT AUTO REAL RADIAN MP $\quad$ ERROR |
| :--- |
| 1:Quit |
| 2: Goto |
| ARGUMENT |
| Check the type and number |
| of arguments. |


| 1:Quit | Displays the home screen |
| :--- | :--- |
| 2:Goto | Displays the previous screen with the cursor at or near the error <br> location |

Note: If a syntax error occurs in the contents of a $Y=$ function during program execution, then the 2:Goto option returns to the $Y=$ editor, not to the program.

## Correcting an Error

To correct an error, follow these steps.

1. Note the error type (ERROR: error type).
2. Select 2:Goto (if it is available). The previous screen is displayed with the cursor at or near the error location.
3. Determine the error. The error screens give helpful hints about what may have happened, but the errors are not always fully explained.
4. Correct the expression.
